

The theme of this year's Festival is 'Celebrating Christmas Around the World'. Local organisations and schools will be busy working on their ideas for decorating their trees.


Last year's trees were stunning and decorated to a very high standard and our hope is that this year's trees will be just as interesting given the theme.

Trees in Cramond

The work of Cramond Commemorates continues and we plan to have around 100 trees and bulbs planted over this winter. The next planting will be a year on from the first sessile oak (which is doing very well) and will be in and around Cramond Primary with a mixture of bulbs and trees. With generous help from local landowners, we have hopes of some trees in the walled garden and others in the field in front of Cramond house. The project will conclude at Christmas, though the planting will continue until March 2023. The trees will be tagged and looked after. Finally, one of the trees will mark the long and celebrated reign of Queen Elizabeth the second.



Cramond Kirk Estate

During the past two years, the Kirk Session have endorsed improvements within the hall and surrounding grounds. These have included, new windows, new kitchen and recently the small tea bar now supporting the daily operation of the Gathering Space cafe.

We now have a new Memorial Garden located within the grounds adjacent to the Kirk Manse with double sided granite memorials, providing a place of remembrance and sanctuary for those no longer with us. The main Kirk Cramond drive and Memorial Garden have also benefited from major surface improvements involving the laying of new tar. The tar which has been employed, was sourced from Cowieslinn Quarry near Eddleston, Peeblesshire, and was then laid by Irvine Plant of Peebles. This now means that Cramond Kirk has a depth of six inches of Peeblesshire laid within our grounds.

This extensive activity was undertaken in May, involved initially transporting numerous machines on a large flatbed lorry, which was unloaded at the top of Cramond Glebe Road and then each machine was driven down and stored in the hall grounds. The work was





Christian Aid "The virtue of hope is what drives us"

In November 2021 Dr John Sentamu, former Archbishop of York, was appointed Chair of Christian Aid and in the latest edition of the Christian Aid magazine, he chats about his faith and his support for Christian Aid. The following is an excerpt from the Christian Aid article :

John's first experience of Christian Aid was as a newly ordained deacon, being sent out by the vicar to collect door to door and he still believes collecting house to house is "quite wonderful" with a simple message – "We are Christian Aid – we are here to support, to encourage, to stand alongside people living in poverty, and that's what inspires me."

John does not see Christian Aid as an organisation, he sees it as a movement for change and when asked what he hoped to bring to the role of Christian Aid Chair, John said "I was brought up in Uganda and when I came to this country, I discovered whoever you are, human beings are human beings. What I want to bring is my understanding of God, of humanity and the church. If you believe in the God of love and compassion and kindness, then you believe that every human person is of unique worth to God, and everybody is standing on holy ground because



they are created in God's image and likeness. One of the things I think God gave me is a sense of cheerfulness and being hopeful. So I want to raise people's sights to this wonderful sense of hope, to realise that things may at times be terrible and awful, but this virtue of hope is what drives us. In the words of Desmond Tutu, we are the people who are "prisoners of hope" and we want to give and share this hope with everybody."

TCP News update!

Dear all,

It has been so wonderful being able to visit TCP more regularly with children from St Andrew's School (the local prep school which supports the project). We now have a 'TCP Impact Group,' who spend time during Scouts each Friday playing games, doing art work and providing activities for the TCP children. The term dates don't always match up perfectly (St Andrew's follows the British academic year whilst the local schools' year is January to December) so when the Impact Group can't go, they help to organise fundraisers and promote charity at school. It is my aim that all St Andrew's School children will go to TCP at least once this academic year, to interact with the children and understand the charity better.

We are aware that times are tough around the world with the cost of living crisis affecting people in all areas. For TCP. we have concerns about the children in our care. The Micah Project, which provided a breakfast of uji porridge for everyone at the children's school until July this year, had to close and so now these children go to school very hungry each day. The project was similar to Mary's Meals, which you may have heard of. Sadly, due to rising costs of ingredients and sponsorship drying up, the project has closed and is making the TCP children more vulnerable and poverty-stricken. Furthermore, the exchange rate is so poor at the moment that when we convert money from UK pounds, we are losing a lot of the money. As costs of ingredients increase in price, we do have concerns about the future of TCP. If you are able to commit to donating regularly, please do get





in touch via email, Facebook or on the website. We truly want to provide these children with a hope and a future and would love more financial support to keep doing this.

Tom takes his leave

With a fine sermon on the theme of music, our Associate Minister Tom Cuthell led our worship for the last time at the end of August. We're most grateful for Tom's contribution to the life of our Kirk over the years.



The Forget-Me-Not Garden at Lauriston Castle Lodge is a community/memory garden and hub offering help, information and advice for people with memory impairment and their carers.

It grew from a dementia café which started in the Kirk Hall in 2011 when Cramond and Barnton Community Council and Alzheimer Scotland got together where a seed was sown to establish a focal point that could be better served by providing a bespoke centre for relaxation, stimulation and assistance.

Initial fund-raising paid for fees to obtain planning permission and originate plans for the lodge and garden. Then began the task of raising the funds to carry out the work. It was decided that the project would be carried out in two phases. Phase 1 would be designing and constructing the memory garden. Phase 2 would be to have the lodge completely renovated and reconstructed as a dementia support centre.

One in 6 people in the UK will be affected directly or indirectly by dementia in their lifetime. It is known that a garden has positive effects on improving the physical and mental well-being of dementia patients. The

community garden offers therapeutic benefits by way of sensory planting, gardening activity, reminiscence features and awareness elements. Volunteers will be on hand to offer informal support for people with dementia to access the garden with friends and family, helping to reduce isolation.

Cramond Walkers – Winter 2022

Cramond Walkers continue their full programme of walks through the winter. On a mix of days, each month there are three walks, of which one is by car share from Barnton Avenue West and the others do-able by bus (or meet at the start). Most walks are 8 - 12 km (5 - 8 miles) starting mid-morning. We recommend carrying a drink and packed lunch. For more details, email cramond. walkers@yahoo.co.uk or see Cramond Kirk website. Reports with photos are on Cramond Walkers Facebook page. Organisers are Fiona Black 339 6644 and Simon Gillam 339 2614.

Thursday, 10 November: Seafield / Kinghorn Loch Circuit 10 km. An inland walk from Kirkcaldy esplanade to Kinghorn Loch, returning via Kinghorn and Fife Coastal Path. Bus X58 at 9.50 from Barnton, or south end of Kirkcaldy esplanade at 10.40.

Friday, 18 November: Rumbling Bridge 6 km or 10.5 km. A circuit from Crook of Devon, including the River Devon and Rumbling Bridge gorge, with options at the end for a direct return to the village or a longer loop to the east and south. Meet: Barnton Avenue West at 9.50 or Powmill café at 10.30.

Saturday, 26 November: Callendar Park to Falkirk Wheel 10.5 km. A varied walk south of Falkirk, including Callendar Park, the Falkirk Muir battlefield, Rough Castle Roman fort and the Falkirk Wheel. Bus X38 at 9.45 from Maybury or the north edge of Callendar Park at 10.50.

Friday, 2 December: Glenrothes town art and Riverside Park 9 km. The route allows us to see about 30 pieces of town art, in the town centre and Riverside Park, including paths beside the River Leven and Lothrie burn. Bus X54 from Barnton at 9.25 or Glenrothes bus station at 10.25.

Wednesday, 7 December: Barnton to Saughton Park 7 km. We will walk through Barnton Park Woods, then join the John Muir Way to climb over Corstorphine Hill and continue to Saughton Park where there is a cafe. Meet 10.30 at Barnton shops.



Saturday, 7 January: Crieff including Hosh and The Knock. Around 8 km including riverside paths and the small hill above Crieff. Meet Barnton Avenue West at 9.30 or meet at MacRosty Park in Crieff at 10.40.

Wednesday, 18 January: Dreghorn to Flotterstone. A walk south through the Pentland Hills, about 7 km with some climbing but not over any summits. Meet 10.30 at Hunter's Tryst Lothian 27 bus terminus. Return to Edinburgh on hourly bus from Flotterstone.

Thursday, 26 January: A 10.5 km circuit, west along the Forth and Clyde canal, then following the Antonine Wall east past Bar Hill Roman fort and Croy Hill, then back by the canal. Meet 9.30 at Barnton Avenue West or 10.20 at the car park opposite Auchinstarry Marina (between Croy and Kilsyth).

Saturday, 4 February: Union Canal in Edinburgh. Meet 10.00 at the start of the canal (near Fountainbridge) to walk 8 km west / south-west along the canal-side path to Calder Road at Hermiston.

Thursday, 16 February: Charlestown to Forth Road Bridge. A walk of 10 km, mostly following the Fife Coastal Path. Bus X55 from Barnton at 9.30 or meet at 10.45 at Charlestown lime kilns (park at Limekilns Pier then 10-15 minute walk).

Friday, 24 February: Falkland Estate including Maspie Den. Around 8 km of varied routes around the estate. Meet Barnton Avenue West at 9.30 or at Falkland Estate car park at 10.15.
